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**York Lammass Assizes, 1811.**

Yesterday afternoon the business at the Crown end closed. The following is a complete statement of all the Prisoners brought before the Court, with the verdicts delivered by the Jury. The sentence of each prisoner not having been delivered by the Judge, previous to our paper going to press: we shall give a correct account of them in our succeeding publication.

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## York Lammis Assizes, 1811

**WILLIAM ENTWISTLE** was indicted for stealing

a Mare, the property of John Carter.

Mr. WATSON related the leading circumstances of the case, and called the following witnesses—

**JOHN CARTER**, of Appleton, in the County of Chester, stated that on the 29th of April last, he had a Brown Mare, which he watered and served up in his Stable about 2 o'clock that evening; he bolted the back door of the Stable and locked the front one; next morning about 5 o'clock, Witness found the back door of the Stable open, and the Mare gone.—Witness received the Mare from Paul Couldwell, the Constable of Warrington, on the 12th of May following; he described the Mare and knew her again by her marks; it was the same Mare he had lost.

**JAMES ATKINSON**, Junr. lives with his Father, who keeps an Inn at Northallerton; Witness acts as a Hostler—he says there is a Fair for Horses, &c. held at Northallerton on the 5th of May, but the shew for Horses commences a week before, and continues till the Fair day in the evening; on the 3d of May two men came to the Witness's Father, each riding a Mare—one of them (the Prisoner) rode a Brown one, and the other (William Bailey) a Bay one.—Witness took the Brown Mare of the Prisoner and put her up; Prisoner cauled her, and litted her up for the night, and next morning was going into the Fair with the Mare, when Witness advised him to keep her till Monday (the Fair day); being a powerful Mare Witness thought she might sell to more advantage on that day; Prisoner answered he brought her to sell and was determined to sell her before he brought her in again.—Prisoner took the Mare away and Witness did not see her again till the seventh; she was then in the hands of John Carter, the Constable of Northallerton. Witness described the Mare in the manner she was described by the Owner. Witness saw the Mare again in the possession of Paul Couldwell. Prisoner was apprehended before the Mare was delivered to the Constable and Bailey likewise the next day.

WILLIAM WILLIAMSON is a Horse-dealer, living at Leeds, he was at Northallerton Fair on the 4th of May last, and bought the Mare of the Prisoner for 12l. which he paid, and took the Mare from the Prisoner at the New Inn. Witness delivered the Mare to the Constable of Northallerton on the Monday.

JOHN CARTER, the Constable of Northallerton, went to Atkinson's, the New Inn, on Saturday, the 4th of May, being sent to appraise the Hutchinson—the Mare was brought to the Witness on Monday the 5th, by the Beadle of Northallerton, when Williamson told Witness it was the same he had bought; Witness sent the Mare to the Tickle Toby Inn, and saw her there afterwards; the Mare remained there until the Witness removed her to the New Inn on the 7th, and on the 9th she was delivered to Paul Couldwell, the Constable of Warrington. Witness had the Mare first in the Playhouse Yard, but thought she was not safe there.

PAUL COULDWELL, Deputy Constable of Warrington, went to Northallerton on the 9th of May in the morning; he took possession of the Mare from John Carter, of Northallerton, at the New Inn, that day, in the presence of James Atkinson. Witness took the Mare to Warrington and delivered her to John Carter, the Prosecutor, on the 11th of May.

JAMES ATKINSON was called again, he said the same Mare which the Prisoner brought was delivered to Paul Couldwell.

WILLIAM WHITE, Constable of Sand-Hutton, near Northallerton, said he apprehended the Prisoner at Sand Hutton, on Sunday, the 5th of May, and on taking him to Northallerton, he broke away, and Witness apprehended him again at Thirsk, the day after, Witness took a watch, a Pocket book, about 5s. in silver, and a Steel File from the Prisoner on the Sunday, which he produced.

JOHN CARTER, the Prosecutor, was called again by the Council for the Prisoner, and questioned as to the property of the Mare; he said he was a labouring man, had a son lived with him who deposited 4 or 5 guineas for the purchase of the Mare; his son used her to lead coals for hire; she was the property of Witness and his son.

To Questions by his Lordship, Witness said his son lent him money when the Mare was purchased his son used her whenever he chose, without asking his permission.—The son had left Witness's house on the 9th of April, last.

The Jury wishing to be better informed relative to the joint property of each in the Mare, the Prosecutor was again called and the following question put to him by the Judge, "when the son used the Mare did he receive the hire for his own use?" Prosecutor answered, "No, I always received the hire for my individual use."

The Prisoner made no defence, and after his Lordship had summed up the evidence, the Jury returned a verdict of GUILTY.

[The Prisoner was also tried for returning from Transportation before the expiration of his term and found GUILTY.]
