October 6. Since my last communication, we have had a few smirt showers sufficient to freshen the grass, after our late h avy rains mentioned in last report. The river is now fordable, eight heavy liden weggons having crossed to day, besides several other teams that crossed last week, conveying the clips of Messrs. J. and J. Doyle, of Morrabillah, and Messrs. Lord Scemey have finished shearing, as also Charl and M'Niver. ton, and from what I can learn the clips surpass any ofprevious seasons. Brewarring Police Court, September 30th, 1871. Before James Govan and Harris Cohen, J.P., Henry Johnson was brought before the court, on warrant, charged with stealing a saddle and bridle of the value of £6, the property of Henry Coppard, of Milroy Station. The case was conducted by senior-constable M'Elligott, in a very able manner. From the evidence of the prosecutor, it appeared that prisoner was shearing at the Milroy shed, and one evening decamped, taking with him the saddle and bridle in question, which were both identified by Coppard as his property. The prisoner upon receiving the usual caution by the Beach, replied that he had nothing to say. He was committed to take his trial at the next Bourke Quarter Sessions. It transpires that the prisoner Johnson is a connection of the bushranger of the same name, and great praise is due to the police on bringing this young worthy so speedily to justice. Before James Govan, Harris Cohen, and John Kennedy Doyle, J.P. The same prisoner stands charge with stealing a horse, the property of Robert Elliott, of Milrey Station. The evidence for prosecution was to the effect that the prisoner had been working at the Milroy woolshed, and stole the horse in question. He was arrested at Gongolgen, and remanded to Brewarrina, for the production of witnesses. Heat first denied having any horse, but upon being arrested by the police and being shown a horse in their possession he owned the animal and acknowledged having stolen it. The decision of the bench was the same as in the ormer case.

In the Small Debts Court, on Monday, Alex. Ramsay v. Henry Johnson, £8 16s., for labour and materials. In this case there was a vast amount of words, and, as the bench said, some very hard swearing. It appeared that the plaintiff had done some work on a cottage belonging to defendant, but it transpired that a third party had engaged the plaintiff, with the understanding that the bill was to be deducted from the rent. DISTRICT COURT.-This court was opened before his Honor Judge Josephson, on Tuesday, 8th instant. Mackay v. Roberts, verdict for plaintiff, £13 10s and costs. 'Lunn v. Divine, debt acknowledged. Several cases were settled out of court. This closed the civil business.

QUARTER SESSIONS .- This court was opened before the chairman, Judge Josephson, on Wednesday, 9th instant. Mr Docker prosecuted for the Crown Three jurymen were fined £2 each. George Watts pleaded guilty to obtaining money under false pretences W. Hookins was found guilty of a similar crime. Henry Johnson was found guilty of stealing a saddle, and on a second charge of stealing a horse. Thomas Wells was found guilty of stealing money. On Thursday, the court opened at 9 a.m., and one juror was fined £2. James Seymour, charged with stealing a cart and harness, was found guilty, though he defended himself with vigour. Michael Griffith, charged with hous-breaking, was a quitted. Wilson, alias Frazer, on bail, did not appear when called on, and a warrant was issued for his apprehension On Friday, 1 th, Joseph [Gilbert was found guilty of receiving stolen money. James Brown, charged with wounding and cutting, was acquitted. The prisoners were then severally sentenced. George Watts, six months' in Bourke gao!. W. Hopkins, two years' in Parlinghurst. H. Johnson, twelvo months' in Darlinghurst. The same, for horse stealing, two years in Darlingherst; sentances not concurrent. Themas Wells, two years' hard labour in Darlinghurst. James Seymour, received a similar sentence. Joseph Gilbert, t relve months' in Bathurst gaol. In closing the court, the chairman commented in strong terms on the conduct of Lurin, the publican, who prosecuted in the case of Watts.
